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Welcome to AP US Government and Politics! Throughout this course, students practice the skills used by political scientists by studying data, political writings from the founding era to the present, the structure of the government as established by the Constitution, and constitutional interpretations handed down by the Supreme Court. Students will show mastery of these skills on the exam through a variety of means, including concept application, data analysis, Supreme Court case comparisons, and writing political science arguments. The course prepares students for intermediate and advanced college courses by making demands upon them equivalent to those made by full year introductory college courses. As this course covers a substantial amount of material spanning it is imperative that we hit the ground running in September. As such, the following assignments are designed to ensure that you are familiar with both the rigor and pace of the course.

So, what are the assignments? You will complete three parts in which you will read excerpts concerning the development and understanding of United States Government and Politics. Each part comprises essays relating to both the required texts. These assignments must be completed by August 31st at 11:59pm (ET) and submitted via Google Classroom. Please note that these are hard deadlines; meaning that if work is not submitted on time, you may be removed from the course.

## Assignments

**Guidelines:** You will be required to read different excerpts from various authors and foundational documents and provide 3 follow up essays. The readings can be found in Google Classroom and are also linked below:

**Format:** All of your essays must feature an introduction with a strong thesis statement followed by at least four paragraphs that contain numerous facts and details that support your thesis statement, including a counterclaim and rebuttal. Your essays should be at least two pages in length, double-spaced with 12-point font. You must type your essays.

### Essay 1

☐ Read the excerpts from Locke, Hobbes, and Rousseau. Then, write an essay that addresses the following prompt:

What similarities and differences can you identify between Hobbes, Locke, and Rousseau's view of the natural state of man and the subsequent role of government? Please reference the social contract in your essay.

### Essay 2

☐ Read the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution. Then, write an essay that addresses the following prompt:

To what extent do the ideas of Hobbes, Locke, and Rousseau serve as the intellectual foundation for the constitution of the United States' government? You are encouraged to write about all three. Please provide specific examples in your response.

### Essay 3

☐ After completing all readings and essays, respond to the following prompt:

What, do you believe, is the nature of man and the role of government? In other words, what should the government be responsible for? How much power should a government have? Support your answer by referencing at least 3 of the assigned texts. Your answer to this question forms the foundation of not only this class, but of your own relationship to American Politics.
